

Human Rights Clinic seeks provider volunteers for forensic exams

Did you know Denver Health has a program that supports asylum seekers? The Human Rights Clinic (HRC) provides medical and mental health forensic exams for individuals applying for asylum and other legal statuses in Colorado and surrounding states. The HRC at Denver Health is the only asylum clinic in the Rocky Mountain region. Legal partners refer clients to the HRC, and volunteer medical and mental health providers conduct the forensic exams at Denver Health or at the immigration detention facility in Aurora.

The clinic has helped more than 160 people seeking asylum from 37 countries. One volunteer evaluator, Dr. Rehaan Shaffie, said: "You helped me get started in this work and it's been one of the most rewarding and fulfilling endeavors I've done at DH. It's helped to protect me against (or at least lessen) my burnout."

Any providers interested in volunteering must fill out this form and complete an asylum training before taking part in an evaluation.
