# Community leaders meet with East High students to tackle solutions to gun violence

IN THE COMMUNITY

Students from East High School's Students Demand Action group held a community meeting March 9 to discuss gun violence,

a week after marching on the state Capitol to protest the shooting of a 16-year-old classmate who later died of his injuries. The summit brought together 14 panelists including two Denver City Council members, two state lawmakers, three medical doctors, three violence prevention experts, the school principal and DPS Superintendent, and Denver Police Chief Ron Thomas. Steve F MD represented Denver Health in his capacity as a pediatrician, chief of Government and Community Affairs and as a parent to DPS students.

Dr. Federico spoke to the importance of more investment in youth mental health services and committed that Denver Health would continue to partner with DPS and the community to take care of students, faculty, health care workers and neighbors.



Those who may have been exposed have already been contacted and will be tested. "There isn't a risk of ongoing transmission," Bill Burman, MD with the TB Clinic said in an interview with CBS Colorado.
