#### HITeam members receive Ebola vaccine

The Denver Health High-risk Infection Team (HITeam) is the first among **Regional Emerging Special Pathogens Treatment Centers (RESPTC)** in the U.S. to offer the Ebola vaccine to its team members. Paramedic Frank Warren (pictured, right) and surgical **ICU nurse Ben Comden** were the first HITeam members to receive the vaccine, on Nov. 7. The HITeam has about 50 members from various departments across Denver Health.



The vaccine is only approved and recommended for use among health care workers with a risk of exposure to the Ebola virus, though there

is currently no threat of an outbreak in the U.S. The vaccine is voluntary, but many HITeam members have expressed interest in getting it.

"This vaccination drive is just one example of how the Denver Health HITeam is continuously working behind the scenes to ensure that we are prepared for the next special pathogen outbreak," said **Jacob** Wiersch, program manager, region 8 RESPTC.

#### Peer recovery coach role expanded

Denver Health recently expanded the peer recovery coach position into peer recovery coach I, peer recovery coach II and peer recovery coach supervisor. Peer recovery coaches are individuals with lived experience of substance use and/or mental health challenges who have been successful in the recovery process and have shown effectiveness in helping others experiencing similar situations. The expansion of this role is intended to better recognize the value of peer recovery coaches, further develop our workforce and retain our staff with lived experience.



This peer recovery coach job ladder was made possible by the **Center for Addiction Medicine** in consultation with members of **Outpatient Behavioral Health Services** as well as the grantfunded project Utilizing Peers for Linkage, Innovation, and to Foster Thriving.

When asked what this means to **Bob Schulz**, a current peer recovery coach supporting the UPLIFT program, he said, "It warms my heart to see Denver Health allowing us to grow and define the role for the peer support position. Knowing that I can progress in my career at Denver Health while being able to continue to use my lived experience as an asset gives me a sense of purpose and direction."

Keep an eye on Workday for open positions on the peer recovery coach team, and if you know of a candidate for these positions, you can refer them and take advantage of the "Catch That Star" incentive bonus. #### **CEO speaks during Integrated Behavioral Health meeting**

**CEO Donna Lynne** spoke to a packed room of behavioral health providers plus additional staff at the quarterly **Integrated Behavioral Health (IBH)** meeting Nov. 1.

**Interim Director Matt Hoag** asked Lynne to share an overview of Denver Health and to recognize the hard work and success of the IBH team, which has grown from 10 to 60 providers in just a few years. IBH providers offer outpatient behavioral health support across Denver Health and at our community centers. Last year the team facilitated 40,000



"Your work touches nearly every corner of Denver Health, and I will continue to champion your efforts everywhere I go," Lynne told the group.

The message was important to hear for a team that still feels burned out from the pandemic, is in transition after the departure of longtime director Jen Grody, and is worn down from the demands of onthe-spot patient visits. Many providers have also experienced their fair share of workplace violence.

Lynne reiterated the message that providers need to take care of themselves at the same time as they are caring for patients. She wanted the entire team to know how committed she is to behavioral health across the health care system.

"You bring great value to how Denver Health is perceived in the community; when we talk about ROI, it isn't always the investment that matters, it's the impact," Lynne said. "Please know that you make a big impact within our organization and among the communities we serve."

#### Great American Smokeout encourages guitting smoking

Today, Nov. 16, is the American Cancer Society's (ACS) annual Great American Smokeout, which encourages people who smoke to commit to healthy, smoke-free lives. Denver Health encourages our community members who smoke to quit today or to make a plan to quit. Smoking is the largest preventable cause of death and illness in the world, according to the ACS, resulting in nearly a half-million deaths a year. The ACS website has tips and resources to help people quit smoking. The Public Health Institute at Denver Health also has tips to help you stop smoking.



Becky Bloedow, advanced practice provider at the Westwood Family Health Center, is the director of the Tobacco Cessation Clinic at Denver Health, and she is working with community partners to help decrease smoking rates and second-hand smoke exposure within our patient population.

"We should express a sense of urgency to our patients regarding the importance of quitting smoking and remind them that quitting at any age can reduce the risk of adverse health effects," she said.

Denver Health offers one-on-one tobacco cessation telehealth visits that can be scheduled via MyChart or the Denver Health appointment center at 303-436-4949.

CDC reports childhood vaccination exemptions hit highest rate ever Nov. 10, 9News

A new report from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) found a record number of parents and caregivers are opting their kids out of those routine vaccinations.

"We know vaccines work really well to prevent outbreaks from happening. So when we see a dip, we do get worried," said Dr. Sonja O'Leary, director of outpatient general pediatrics with Denver Health.

#### Cases of chickenpox reported among children in Denver migrant shelters Nov. 12, Fox31

Denver Health elaborated on its treatment of the migrants, saying some cases of chickenpox have been diagnosed among children. The health care provider is working with the city to begin immunizing folks in the migrant population.

#### Denver Health's STEP program provides substance use treatment to adolescents Nov. 15, Denver Post

Sofya Hawrylyshyn has been sober since March — a milestone the 19-year-old attributes to Denver Health's adolescent substance abuse treatment program, which she joined last year. STEP provides substance use treatment to adolescents and is in at least 10 school-based health clinics in Denver Public Schools, said Crystal Potter Rivera, executive director of the Denver Health Foundation.

#### \$17M in unpaid claims later, Colorado regulators don't expect another Friday Health debacle *Nov. 13, Denver Business Journal (subscription required)*

Greg McCarthy, chief executive officer of Denver Health Medical Plan (DHMP), said DHMP will expand from serving four to 13 counties in Colorado and expects to grow by up to 10% next year, McCarthy said. Currently, the carrier has about 9,000 enrollees.

#### DPS is helping its migrant students catch up on required vaccinations
