Pharmacy by Mail sees continued growth

In a post-pandemic world, access to quality health care and medication is more vital than ever. Denver Health's Central Fill Pharmacy plays a critical role in ensuring our community has convenient access to necessary medication.

The Central Fill Pharmacy, 500 Quivas St., opened in 2004 and has seen steady growth of its Pharmacy by Mail program. For the third quarter of 2023, orders increased 29% compared with the same guarter last year. Boosted by the COVID-19 pandemic, the pharmacy saw exponential growth in recent years, with an astonishing 845% increase from Q3 of 2019 to Q3 of 2023.

These numbers are not only limited to the Denver metro area. Although the average patient lives 11 miles from a Denver Health location, some live much farther (see map).

"In Q3, we mailed prescriptions to our most distant patient, in Cortez, Colorado, 380 miles away, or a drive of nearly seven hours in good weather," said Warren Streck, BSPharm, MS, PharmD, BCACP, manager of the Central Fill Pharmacy (pictured).

From Cortez to Julesburg, Trinidad to Fort Collins, and everywhere in between, patients can be confident that they can receive their prescriptions by mail within three to five days at no additional cost.

"All social determinants of health aside, we like to think that the positive impact of mailing prescriptions to our patient in Cortez and the thousands who live closer is beyond measure," Streck said.

Denver Health team changes lives during Honduras trip

Katie Sutton became the first student registered nurse anesthetist (SRNA) to join the World Surgical Foundation on its annual surgical brigade to a hospital in San Pedro Sula, Honduras, Sept. 24-29. Sutton, who is training at Denver Health, had the opportunity to work alongside a diverse team of some of the world's top surgeons and physicians from an array of specialties including neurosurgery, general surgery, pediatrics, gastroenterology, orthopedics, plastics, oncology and trauma.



The hospital, Mario Catarino Rivas, serves the indigent

population not only from around the city, but from villages hundreds of miles away. Patients had traumatic orthopedic injuries, many as a result of violence and major car accidents. These patients were forced to wait weeks for an opportunity to receive treatment due to a lack of resources. Upon arriving, the team was able to collaborate with local surgical teams to open additional operating rooms in the hospital overnight.

The team consisted of three other certified registered nurse anesthetists, Adol Wold, CRNA, Clay Dobronyi, CRNA, and Yannick Macaulay, CRNA, all trained at Denver Health. Together, the team (pictured, from left, are Wold, Dobronyi, Sutton and Macaulay) successfully performed 130 surgeries and anesthetics, including 42 operations on pediatric patients. Denver Health's collaboration and knowledge sharing during this mission trip will help the local practice in Honduras to implement additional regional anesthesia in the future.

"We made lasting connections with the local providers that will benefit patients for years to come. I personally learned a great deal from the local anesthesia providers who were a wealth of knowledge, ingenuity and compassion," Sutton said. "Furthermore, I want to thank World Surgical Foundation and everyone at Denver Health who has supported me along the way."

Safety improvements coming to Emergency Department Our efforts to improve the safety and security of our workplaces continues with some changes to the Emergency Department (ED). Along with implementing safety checks at the main hospital, running a trial of a safety checkpoint at the Adult Urgent Care Center, increasing security rounding in the garages, and piloting the De-escalation Activation Response Team (DART), we also are adjusting the entry point into our Emergency Department to one safety check station.

The move frees up the security guard at the entrance to the Pediatric Emergency Department and Urgent Care Center (PEDUC). The guard will now be available to support all areas of the ED. Patients who arrive on their own will all begin at a single point of entry in Pavilion A.

After patients are screened, they will be registered. Our pediatric patients will be directed to their own waiting room where they will be triaged and treated in the PEDUC. A new door has been added to aid in the flow of patients. Adult patients will continue to be triaged to the adult waiting room and treated in the adult ED.

This change will allow us to maintain a greater security presence in the waiting rooms and increase guard rounds in the ED and is intended to increase our ability to respond more promptly to incidents by now having up to two officers rounding in the department.

The PEDUC change is the latest move by leadership to support Denver Health's focus on making necessary adjustments to ensure the organization's overall safety. The Workplace Safety and Violence Prevention Committee continues to review additional ideas and measures that also will advance this critical work.

use

When a parent struggles with addiction, the whole family struggles. Sesame Workshop, the nonprofit behind "Sesame Street," is teaming up with Denver Health to develop and implement vital resources within our network. This is thanks to a Foundation for Opioid Response Efforts grant provided to leverage existing tools, create new resources, and develop professional training to improve connections between parents, caregivers and young children, leading to family resilience.



This includes expanding the Workshop's Parental Addiction Initiative, which uses storybooks, video and interactive digital activities featuring the Muppet Karli (pictured, courtesy Sesame Workshop) to help children affected by parental substance use understand addiction and discuss how it affects them. These

resources will be available online and in person throughout Denver Health's pediatrics settings.

"Denver Health is receiving a portion of the grant money to provide feedback on Sesame Workshop materials about parental substance use from staff and patients, including provider trainings, family materials, and use of these materials in behavioral health care," said Colleen Fischer, PhD, psychologist APP lead.

Beginning in February, Denver Health will administer surveys, conduct focus groups and utilize the materials, which will be provided through the child and Family-Oriented Resilience Growth and Empowerment (FORGE) outpatient teams. Following the initial study, these efforts will expand to other pediatric settings in the hospital.

These tools will provide an invaluable resource to families of parents struggling with substance misuse, allowing children and parents alike to gain the understanding and sense of security necessary to reestablish trust, which is needed for a healthy upbringing.

"We are honored to partner with an organization committed to 'help children grow smarter, stronger, and kinder,' especially those in families with substance misuse. We are excited to elevate the voices of our staff and families in this endeavor," Fischer said.

Tips to help you stay safe when traveling around the holidays

Holiday safety is an issue that burns brightest from late November to mid-January, when families gather, parties are scheduled and travel spikes. Traveling by car during the holidays has the highest fatality rate of any major form of transportation based on fatalities per passenger mile. In 2020, it is estimated 163 people died on New Year's Day, 485 on Thanksgiving Day, and for Christmas Day, it is estimated 340 lost their lives, according to the National Safety Council. The Denver Health Trauma and Injury Prevention Program has a blog with travel safety tips to ensure you and your loved ones stay safe during the holidays.

One city's surprising tactic to reduce gun violence: solving more nonfatal shootings Oct. 30, USA Today

Historically, Denver's gun murder rate has been about average among large American cities. Minorities have borne a disproportionate share of the violence: An analysis by the **Public Health Institute at Denver Health** found that Black people in Denver were about five times as likely to be murdered with guns as White people between 2011 and 2015.

In a departure from recent years, City Council passes \$17 million in budget amendments Oct. 30, Denverite

During its budget hearing, **Denver Health CEO Donna Lynn** pleaded with City Council and the Mayor's office for more funding to the safety net hospital, which treats a lot of homeless and uninsured patients. Costs have skyrocketed, while the city's contribution to caring for uninsured patients has stayed steady. The hospital ran a \$32 million deficit in 2022.

Denver City Council sends major rental assistance amendment to Mayor Johnston

Oct. 31, The Denver Post The group also supported dedicating another **\$1.8 million to unfunded care at Denver Health**, the city's safety net hospital, next year. Denver Health officials estimate the institution is facing a \$70 million shortfall in that category. The council earlier this month asked Johnston to budget an additional \$15 million to cover some of that beyond the city's existing \$30 million commitment. He responded with \$3 million before Monday's amendment.

FDA takes first step to protect children from medications that look and taste like candy

Is that gummy a vitamin or candy? It can be hard to tell, especially for children. Dr. Christopher Hoyte, medical director of the Rocky Mountain Poison & Drug Center, suggested a straightforward definition for candylike medications. Anything "reasonable that a person would look at it and have a sort of difficult time telling the difference between the two," he said.

The number of people homeless in the Denver metro area has increased nearly 60% between 2016 and 2023, according to the Common Sense Institute. The homeless population is 9,065, compared to 5,728 in 2016. CU Nursing alums Kiera Connelly and Kellie Thompson work the night shift as nurses at **Denver Health.** On their days off, they volunteer with a street medicine program walking and driving around providing essential healthcare to people in need.

Other cities are trying to manage as best they can, like Denver, where nearly 26,000 migrants have arrived within the last year. Dr. Steve Federico, Government and Community Affairs Chief at **Denver Health**, said the city's process is inadequate. Migrants are asked by shelter staff if they need immediate medical attention. If they say yes, they're either sent to an emergency room or connected by phone with the NurseLine through Denver Health.


