


The lungs and asthma

When asthma is under control:

The airways are wide open and it is easy to breathe.

When asthma is NOT under control:

The airways <u>narrow</u> and it becomes <u>harder</u> to breathe.

- Tiny muscles squeeze and tighten around the airways like rubber bands.
- The inside of the airways get swollen.
- The inside of the airways make thick, sticky mucus.
